Services by the Numbers

6,424 CALLS



Our professional intake workers received over 6,000 calls from April to March. These amazing staff members are the first point of contact for the public to call and assess next steps when individuals are concerned about a child, family or themselves.



13,253 children 484 in care

In approximately 97% of the situations we investigate, the children involved remain in their homes with their families or legal guardians. This past year we provided services to over 13,000 children in our community. As a Children's Aid Society, we also provide substitute care for children in need of protection from physical, emotional, sexual abuse or neglect. Over the course of the year, a small number of children were removed from their living situations for their safety and well-being. 246 children were admitted to care throughout the year, 223 children were discharged from care and at the end of March 2016, there were 484 children in care.



402 WALK-IN CLINIC CLIENTS

Our Counselling Walk-In Clinic provides immediate access to confidential therapy services for children, youth and their families in Muskoka. Clients meet with trained therapists for problem solving and supportive conversation.

A sense of permanence and stability are critical to a child's well-being and development. When that cannot be achieved with their birth family, adoption may become an option. We were successful in finding the right family for 28 children this year.

FINALIZED ADOPTIONS

381 Staff We are a highly educated professional staff of 381 individuals that are dedicated to the health, safety and wellbeing of children, youth and families in our community. In 2015-16 our workforce was made up of 329 full-time, 14 part-time and 38 casual team members. 212 of them hold bachelor's degrees, 44 a master's and 41 have earned a college diploma. Our employees through their own unique contributions, help enhance the safety and wellbeing of children, youth and families.



189 FOSTER & KINSHIP CARE HOMES

When a child's safety and wellbeing are at extreme risk, it is necessary for them to be removed from their family home. When this happens, we place them with families that have been through a rigorous screening process as well as thorough training to be approved as a foster home. Kin that have been screened to be an alternative place of safety for the child/ren to stay are considered Kinship Care homes. We rely on the caring approach and support these 180 families provide to children during a very difficult time in their lives.

110 volunteers

Volunteers are a valuable team of people that bring many skill sets to the agency. They provide direct supports to families such as drivers. mentors, parent assists, or child care volunteers. In addition to the family support work, some help us with office projects, special events and activities in the community. They come from all walks of life including retired professionals, former crown wards, and university students with a view to a career in child protection. One program of note that has been solely volunteer driven is The Welcome Kit Program. An idea from a former youth in care, the kits provide a few necessities and comforting items to help reduce the trauma for children coming into care.

Fundraising & Community

105 FAMILIES

Each month staff contribute money from their paycheques into the "Piggy Bank" fund. This fund is used to provide emergency basic needs for families and children that we



work with. This year, 105 families accessed over \$11,000 of the piggy bank funds for groceries, diapers, clothing, and other items to help them during a crisis.

Many of the families we work with struggle to make ends meet. Or they are facing much bigger challenges than worrying about getting their children ready to go back to school. Through local community partners, we collected, packed and distributed 365 backpacks to children receiving protection services in the year. Community partners involved included Emmanuel Baptist Church in Barrie, PIE Education led by Pie Woodfired Pizza Joint and supported by local businesses in Barrie, Decorators' Edge in Bradford, and Staples in Alliston.

For children, summer should be a time to escape the classroom, head outdoors and experience the wonders of nature. Unfortunately, for many of the children we work with, summer is a lonely time without schoolmates or activities to keep them engaged, healthy and spark their imaginations. Thanks to the generosity of individuals and businesses in our community who donated \$43,653, over 300 disadvantaged children were given the opportunity for a summer experience that will shape their future.

Summer camp and recreational programs offer children the opportunity to try new things in a safe setting, engage with new friends, and gain confidence and skills that can be applied for the rest of their life. We partner with many camps across the County of Simcoe and the District of Muskoka to provide a variety of experiences including leadership, sports, music, culinary and the arts.



Families in our community continue to be challenged to meet the needs of their children. Lack of full-time employment, scarce affordable housing, and the cost of food remain the main contributors to poverty. So at the holiday season, families living in poverty are left to feel

further despair when they are unable to share a small gift with their children. With the generosity of groups, organizations and individuals coming together for toy drives across our region last year, we were able to bring smiles to children's faces and help create happy family memories that will last a lifetime.



Thanks to many thoughtful, giving families, businesses and staff members; 423 families and 88 independent youth received full holiday sponsorship hampers to help make the holiday season a little brighter. Hampers included personalized gifts, clothing, snowsuits, pyjamas, and grocery gift cards.

Sharing a meal together can be an important social and emotional time for families and friends, especially at special occasions. In addition to full sponsorships of families at the holiday time, 387 families received help with their holiday plans in the way of grocery gift cards, pyjamas, winter coats, and other items that would help them create special memories.
